Larger than Life: Memories of Jean McRobert

A Memory from the 50's

Much like Bill Hennessy (See Spring 2010, "Grad Recalls Some Memorable Teachers from The 1950's", P.10), one of my clearest memories in the secondary school category of memories (and, in retrospect, a highlight), was the presence of Jean McRobert.

I had Mr. Dinsmore in my early mathematics courses and I seemed to have been successful, as I was promoted to the first level of Geometry under the guidance of Jean McRobert. My first test results were in the mid 20's. Miss McRobert sensed that I may have had potential, so she moved me to the front left of the classroom. I proceeded to give what I thought was a good effort and waited for the Christmas Exam.

On my return to her classroom in early January, I went to my front row seat, turned the completed exam over and was astounded to see the mark of 96!

On closer examination of the paper, I read the name *Fred Palmer* (not Jamie Hender-

son). Eventually, I made my way to the second last seat in the row by the door and saw MY paper, with the mark of 18. My absence of any sense of mathematical theory and ability was a cruel reality!

Miss McRobert sensed this and suggested I return for further enrichment of the fundamentals of Geometry at the Grade 11 level. She also suggested that I promise that I would not sign up for, or attempt in any way, the final Departmental Examination. I took her advice to heart and did not sit or stand for that exam. I knew then, and know now, that a 72 would never have been a reality.

A Memory from the 70's

I was a member of the Gino Fracas *University of Windsor* football coaching staff for several years in the late 1960's and early 1970's. We had played a game against *Laurentian University* in Sudbury and on the trip home stayed overnight in Orillia. Several team members went out to celebrate, and on their return were very loud and caused some disruption to the guests at the hotel (a great deal of disruption!)

The next morning I was heading into the Dining Room to join the coaches for breakfast, when I noticed two ladies -who looked very much alike - talking to the on-duty

Manager about the noise and mayhem of the previous evening. Before I sat down I glanced toward the ladies one more time, and recognized Jean McRobert. I believe the other person was her twin sister, who had also been a mathematics teacher, in Toronto (I am fairly sure of that because Miss McRobert used to always say "Faster 13D... my sister is two or three lessons ahead with her course")

On sizing up the situation, I slowly made my way out of the Dining Room without saying hello. I regret that now because I know she would have been kind, straightforward and to the point with her words. She likely would have said, "Well, Henderson, I am not surprised at the conduct of the Windsor team knowing that you are part of the leadership component." I will never know, because I missed that opportunity to say "Hello. How are you?". I wanted her to know that she had an impact on my life and career. She once told me I would be surprised what a little discipline and improved study habits would do to make me a better student. She was a person who was larger than life to me, and in her own way made any future education and career choices more rewarding.




It was Chuck Dalton night at SCI.

The Canadians won their first three Preliminary Round games in Helsinki, but lost two very close games in the Main Round (57-55 to Brazil, and 82-81 to Argentina) and were eliminated. The eventual winners were the *USA who* defeated the *USSR* for the gold medal. But this young man from London Ontario had been to the top of the basketball world!

So, when Chuck Dalton returned to *South* this past January, as a spectator at the *South/Laurier* Senior Boys game and the Annual South Men's Alumni Game – a special celebration was in order. A replica jersey, with Chuck's old #1 and his name embroidered, was presented at the scorer's table and Chuck came on the floor to toss up the first ball of the Alumni Game.

It's nice to think of that *South* jersey sharing a place in the Dalton home with Chuck's Olympic shirt, and nice to see the man whose name is engraved on the Honour Roll in the front lobby of *South* back in the school again after more than five decades.







SARAH PAJUK ART PURCHASE AWARD

On Oct. 14, 1989, South student, **Sarah Pajuk**, died tragically in a motorcycle accident. Only 19 years old, Sarah had recently moved to Burlington with her mother, after spending four years at South. A memorial service for Sarah was held at Huron College (where her father worked) and it was attended by a large group of former classmates. The day following this service, many of these students were together on a bus taking a South field trip to the Albright-Knox Gallery in Buffalo. While discussing their grief, they came up with the plan to create an "Art Purchase Award" in memory of Sarah. Subsequently, these students were able to raise enough money to support *The Sarah Pajuk Art Purchase Award* (\$100 annually) for a number of years.

Each year the award is given to a graduating student, one of whose artworks is purchased and hung in the school. The award criteria are said to reflect Sarah's personality. She was a risk-taker: "strong, independent and self-directed, challenging the limits of what can be achieved".

Since the award was first presented, twenty-one art students have been recipients. For the complete list of award winners, see the box to the right. It is interesting to note that two of these winners are now on staff at South: **Andrew Huff ('98)**, a member of the Science Department, and **Irene (Mordas) Radchenko ('99)**, a member of the English Department.

It is equally interesting to note that some of Sarah's family members were unaware of the award that has been given out in her name since 1990. Earlier this year, Art Department Head, Teri Levack, received a phone call from a woman who turned out to be Sarah's aunt Hazel. She had just recently returned to London and was trying to locate another family member, when she came across a reference to the award and wondered if the person being honoured was her niece. Teri confirmed that it was indeed her niece and invited her to come to the school to see some of the artworks purchased in Sarah's name.

Letter from a Remarkable 1930 Grad... 98 Years Young!

It is causing me guilt because I neglected to thank you for the spring (2010) issue of *Lions' Pride*, on which you are doing such a wonderful job. The picture of the staff (1929-30) on the front cover was wonderful, as was the news that our school was once again L.S.C.I. I started at Victoria school and was part of the Tecumseh "safari" from Askin Street. As I looked over all the faces of the staff, it occurred to me, as I named the subject for which each was responsible, that there was an important subject about which each was not aware, but which all were accepting and instilling into all of us. That was the joy of learning.

It was the joy of learning that paved the way for my vocation in a medical specialty until 1984. I left London on August 31 (1939), the weekend that war was declared, and was immediately immersed in the war effort which disrupted the lives of so many in Canada, including mine. After the war, I was able to find some spare time to study tai chi, watercolour painting, silver and goldsmithing and tying trout flies (for the occasional times when I could get fly fishing). In addition to the above, I taught evening classes for over twenty years on the subjects of Meteorology, Advanced Piloting and Celestial Navigation.

Since I retired more than 26 years ago, I have spent four years studying Comparative Religions, and for over twenty years, I have been studying Quantum and Particle Physics. This has been facilitated by finding an American source from which I may obtain courses on CD's and DVD's by top college professors.

And all of the above are not because of me, but due to the teachers in my life, and of course the majority of these are on the front page of last spring's issue. I will be 98 years of age in a few months and it frustrates me not to be able to thank all those teachers in your *Lions' Pride* picture who unconsciously instilled in me that joy of learning that has given me so much pleasure for so many years. My days are full to overflowing and the time remaining is not enough.

It is frustrating that I cannot thank them personally. My only recourse is to thank you for publishing their picture and reminding me what I owe them. Thank you...

IN LOCAL NEWS....



DAN COLFAX ('62), star basketball player during his time at South, and one of the most highly respected high school basketball coaches in the city, is still inspiring kids on the court. Although he's been retired from teaching for several years, he's still coaching basketball at Westminster. This year he took his *Wildcats* senior team, seeded 10th in the province, to the OFSAA AA tournament in North Bay.

PAUL COCKER ('64), President, CEO and Chairman of the Board of McKay-Cocker Construction, was featured on the front cover of *Biz Monday* (LFP, March 14/11). The company, co-founded by his father in 1946, was described as an *"industry icon"*, with *"a reputation for quality and craftsmanship"*. They are currently working on the new Goodwill Office on Horton Street, after recently completing the Hale-Trafalgar Overpass. They are also working on the GM plant in St Catharines.

KNUTE DOHNBERG ('65) was featured in *The Londoner* (Feb. 24/11) as one of just two Londoners who have been awarded membership in the Canadian Ski Instructors' Alliance Hall of Fame. Knute got his start at the London Ski Club in the 1960's, and in 1970, at just 23 years of age, was the youngest instructor to receive CSIA level IV certification. He currently belongs to a club in Beaver Valley, where he still teaches ski instructors on the weekends, when he's not fulfilling his duties as a vice-president of Royal LePage Commercial in London. Knute is also a director of the SCAA.

TED GOODDEN ('66) was featured in *The Londoner* (March. 24/11) in an article entitled "Stained glasses to clay masses". Ted, a well known stained glass artist, just had his first clay sculpture show - a 21 piece exhibit - at The Art Exchange, 247 Wortley Rd. He said that he got interested in clay sculpture while teaching art at Beal, and has been creating "roughly one shape per week for the last twenty years". He felt the time was right to "test new waters" and see if people would respond.

LISA SHACKLETON ('90), who established the **Yoga Shack** in Wortley Village in 2009, was inspired to start up her business after yoga helped her to heal her body following a devastating car accident in Calgary in 2006. From vice-president of a high-tech firm in Calgary to entrepreneur in London was quite a change, but Lisa has been so successful that she was nominated this year for a London Chamber of Commerce *Business Achievement Award* in the small business category. Although she didn't win, Lisa should be proud of what she has accomplished: expanding in just over two years, to two studios and 55 classes a week.

LIL MALINICH ('93), a talented actress who now makes her home in New York City, returns to London every year to hold a fundraising "party" to support the Canadian Cancer Society. While the theme changes every year, comedy, entertainment and dancing are all always central. This year's event, held on Dec. 16th, was called *Speakeasy: A Roaring 1920's Soiree*. Lil held her first "party" in 2007, in honour of her mom, and says it's "always a treat to come back" to London for the event.

ANDREW McCLENAGHAN ('97) whose company, **Echidna Solutions Corp.**, was nominated last year for a Chamber of Commerce *Business Achievement Award* in the small business category, was nominated again this year. (That means that two of the four businesses nominated in this category are run by South grads... pretty impressive) Unfortunately, Andrew didn't win either, but like Lisa, he should be very proud of the success he has achieved. Generations at South: Discovering Family Connections

When I applied to attend South Secondary School in 1996, nobody told me that I would be attending the same high school attended by members from three branches of my family tree....

BLOXAM

Three **Bloxams** attended *London South Collegiate Institute* during the 1940s: **Stanley, Lawrence (Larry)** and **Thelma**, all children of Harry and Mary Bloxam, who were my grandfather's uncle and aunt. Harry owned a farm in what is now Berkshire Village, and the street Bloxam Avenue is named for him where his land used to be. Stanley, Larry and Thelma all attended the now-closed *Brick Street Public School*, before going on to *South*. Their sister Doris died in infancy and brother Bob attended another high school. (Bob Bloxam may be a familiar name to many in the London education system as he was a highly respected principal at *Oakridge Secondary School*, where they have an academic award in his memory.)

Stanley died while a student at *South* on January 20, 1944, two days shy of his sixteenth birthday. He was riding his bicycle and was struck by an automobile at the bottom of Winery Hill (where Wharncliffe Road and Baseline Road intersect), with his brother Larry and about six others witnessing the collision.

Larry was in the school orchestra and played second violin (*Oracle, 1946,* p. 29). He graduated in **1949** and went on to join his father at Empire Brass (now EMCO). I met Larry once to get me more information about our family's history and he showed me the family bible, which (barely) survived the flood of 1937. He also shared some fond memories of his days at *South.* Larry passed away on December 27, 2009 in London.

Thelma (Hauser) graduated in 1952 and currently lives in Grand Bend.

The four sons of Trevor and Agnes Nesbitt attended *South* during the 1920s and 1930s: **John (Jack)**, **Edmund (Eddie**; left *South* in 1931), **Douglas (Doug)**, and **Clayton** (left *South* in 1935). You will find these four men listed in the front foyer of the school on the Active Service Roll, which lists the *South* students who served in the Second World War. Jack, Eddie, and Doug all served in the air force. The family lived on Beaconsfield near the Coves.

Jack had attended *South* at its previous location on Wharncliffe Road (now *Victoria Public School*). He was on the rugby team and the boys' athletic executive in 1929 (*Oracle, 1929*, p. 52 & 57). He left the school in 1930 to attend technical school, possibly at Beal. He would later marry his childhood sweetheart, Edith Mellor, and live near the Coves and in Kensal Park. Jack worked at Goodyear Tire and Rubber and died in Sept. 1991.

Doug left *South* in 1935. He went on to fly 69 missions in the Second World War over Europe and North Africa. In one instance, he was chased by German *Messerschmitts* over the Mediterranean Sea, and thankfully lost them in the clouds.

MELLOR

Edith Mellor and her brother **Harry** attended *South* starting at the *Victoria Public School* location. Their parents were William and Winifred Mellor, and the family lived on Johnson Street near the Coves.

Harry started at *South* in 1924, left in 1928 after grade 12, and returned for two more years 1931. He worked as an accountant, and died young in the early 1950s.

Edith was a basketball player for *South*, and was part of one of the first graduating classes of the modern location of the school. She graduated in **1931** before taking one more year of education at "*Tech*" (*H.B. Beal Secondary School*) in home economics. She and her husband, **Jack Nesbitt**, were childhood sweethearts, both having grown up around the corner from each other. Jack and Edith's youngest son, **Craig**, also attended *South* (left in 1961). Their oldest son, Trevor, married Donna Bloxam, my father's oldest sister, and this is how the Bloxams, the Nesbitts, and the Mellors all connect with *South*.

Author's Note: I attended the 75th Reunion with Edith and Trevor, along with Edith's friend **Kay (Pugh) Smith ('37)** and her husband Al. They thoroughly enjoyed themselves at the reunion and marvelled at how much the school had changed, yet how the spirit remained the same. Edith passed away on January 17, 2004.
