SEPT. 9TH EVENT MARKS BEGINNING OF SOUTH'S CENTENNIAL

As noted in last fall's cover story, London South Collegiate came into being in September 1922, following a fire at Central (then called the London Collegiate) in order to accommodate high school students south of the Thames River. That fall, 290 students and 10 teachers moved into a rather dilapidated building on Askin Street, the original Victoria Public School, vacated earlier that year when Victoria moved into a new building facing Wharncliffe. It was to be South's home for almost 6 years.

Although the old school was torn down many years ago, the SCAA felt it was important to acknowledge South's roots. Under the leadership of committee chair, **Barbara Hoover ('72)**, and with the support of the TVDSB and helpful staff at Victoria Public School, like school librarian **Erin McClenaghan ('90)**, a special memorial event was held on the evening of Friday, September 9th.

Close to 75 people – South alumni, former teachers, special guests and a few just interested in local history, began arriving at 5:30 and were greeted with an unexpected sight: a refurbished 1922 Model T Ford. Our thanks to SCAA director JoEllen Wright ('81) for making the arrangements with the owner, who kindly parked his prized vintage car in the schoolyard for the evening and allowed attendees to have their picture taken sitting in it. Displayed in Victoria's library, were copies of the 12 *Oracles*, the student newspapers produced between 1922 and 1926, along with the 1927 & 1928 student yearbooks. Also on display were printed copies of 28 photos from South's years at the old school. Two PowerPoint presentations helped tell the story of those first six years, while a short video produced by a group of Fanshawe Contemporary Media students, profiling well-known South benefactor Matt Giffen ('85), could also be viewed.

The formal part of the evening began at 7 pm, when SCAA President, **Pete Telford**, officially welcomed everyone and introduced our guest speakers. **Lori-Ann Pizzolato**, TVDSB Trustee for Wards 1, 11,12 & 14 since 2018 and current Board Chair, spoke first, followed by former South principal and South alumnus, **Paul Mennill ('62) (staff 1986-89)**, whose father, Del, attended the Old Victoria school in the 1920's. Our third guest speaker was South's new principal, **Margaret Sullivan**, who also happens to be a South alumna, class of 1992. She was joined on stage by TVDSB Superintendent of Student Achievement, **Sheila Powell**, who spoke briefly before turning the mic over to Margaret.

At 7:40, the sound of bagpipes could be heard coming from the schoolyard, our invitation to go outside for the final "act" of the evening. The kilt clad piper, Thomas Helland, son of alumna Erin McClenaghan and grandson of alumnus Thom McClenaghan ('55), provided an inspiring prelude to the most important part of the evening: the official unveiling of the plaque to commemorate South's "birthplace". As attendees watched, the covering, garnet flannel with silver lettering, was slowly removed to reveal the historic plaque.

The Jeffery/Nursey/Ross Family

One of the people who contacted us about her multigenerational family last spring was **Erin (Nursey) Ross ('93)**, who was happy to report that she, along with her husband Ryan and three sons would be moving back to London from BC this past summer. She said her two older boys would be attending South this fall, in grades 11 & 12, while her youngest would be in grade 7 at Mountsfield. (Note: Erin has since reported that their move went well and they are loving their new home in Old South.)

Erin's family has proud roots in Old South dating back two generations to the four Jeffery brothers who attended South in the 1920's and '30's. The oldest, **Joseph E. Jeffery**, who earned the nickname "Captain Joe", following his active service during WWII, graduated from South in 1926 and the following year presided over the first annual Alumni Banquet as Alumni President. After earning his law degree, he joined London Life Insurance, the company that his grandfather had helped to found and went on to serve as both President and Chairman of the Board. Joe's brother, **Alexander (Alec) H. Jeffery ('28)**, Erin's grandfather, was also a lawyer who served for four years (1949-1953)

as a federal MP for London in the Liberal Government of Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent. Later on, he also served as VP and President of London Life. **Edward A. (Ted) Jeffery ('33)** was Chair of the London Board of Education in the 1960's. He sponsored the *A.E. Jeffery Senior Math Award* which is still presented every year to a graduating South student in his honour. Youngest brother, **Gordon Jeffery ('36)**, served on the Board of London Life but is best known for purchasing and refurbishing the old London East Town Hall as a musical performance centre: Aeolian Hall. The second generation of South graduates include Erin's mother, **Judith (Jeffery) (Nursey) Blackburn ('63)** and her uncle **Alexander M. Jeffery ('56)**, now deceased. Erin is part of the third generation along with her sister **Alexa (Nursey) Kudar ('91)**, whose husband **Greg ('91)** also attended South. And in the next few years three more members

The Thompson Family

When **Ryan Thompson** started grade 9 this fall, he entered as part of another illustrious 3-generation South family. His older sister **Alyssa Thompson** graduated in 2021, an honours student and alumni award winner. She is now in her second year at Western, studying biological anthropology, working towards a specialty in forensic anthropology. She is also very involved with the rowing team,

a high level Varsity sport with a very demanding training schedule.

Ryan and Alyssa's father, **Richard Thompson ('84)**, was a talented athlete with a long list of achievements. A top football player at South, his No. 20 football jersey was retired. He also was the leading London Conference scorer with the South hockey team in 1982-83. Continuing his football career at Mount Allison University, Richard was rookie of the year in 1985, a CIAU All-Canadian in 1988 and an All-Canadian in 1989. Baseball was another sport that Richard excelled at, a star player with the London Majors for 9 seasons (late 80's to 1998). The Majors retired his No. 5 jersey in 2010, and more recently presented him with a golden bat award (2018), honouring him as one of their "all-time greats".

SCHOOL NEWS ... Here and Now

at Centennial Hall on June 23rd, 2022. 50 students, more than a third of the 137 new grads, earned SCAA sponsored Alumni Awards for earning a minimum of 90% in six grade 12 courses. Tala Habayeb won the SCAA sponsored Gold Scholar of the Year Award, as well as four additional awards. Samantha Scholtes, the Silver Scholar of the Year, won five additional awards, including the Old South Community Service Award and the Governor General's Academic Medal. Gaby Scott, the Bronze Scholar, won six other awards, including the Carla Mills Cameron Memorial Award, the John Wall Memorial Scholarship and the McTavish Award OSSTF. Owen Herechuk and Marcus Robinson shared the SCAA sponsored South Anniversary Award, voted on by students and given for participation in sports and other extra-curriculars while maintaining a minimum 80% average. There were several other multiple award winning grads, including Valedictorian Malic Deep who won four awards, in addition to being a nominee for a Schulich Leader Scholarship. Lauren Panabaker won six awards, including the Kate Young Citizenship Award, the Linda Crossley Choreography Award and a Lions' Pride Award.

Administration News: The SCAA is delighted to welcome South alumna **Margaret Sullivan** as South's new principal. Margaret comes to us from Lord Dorchester S.S. **Karen Masson** continues in her role as VP after joining the staff last fall from College Avenue Collegiate in Woodstock.

75th Anniversary Award Winner: Sarah Jaremko

This year the 75th Anniversary Award was presented to **Sarah Jaremko**, a long time teacher at South. This award is given annually to a staff member who has contributed significantly to making South a quality school. Every year the SCAA asks the staff for nominations, and at the SCAA executive meeting in early June Sarah was unanimously voted the most deserving candidate for such an honour. Sarah has been a staff member teaching primarily English, and Latin since 1992 and is a South graduate herself, class of 1987. She was the Staff Advisor for the South Students Council for many years, putting countless hours into organizing events that create the atmosphere South students come to love and expect. She has been known by her students and colleagues to make up an excuse to bring in baked goods almost every day. Sarah has since retired, but given her love for South, has come back to supply teach at the school. This goes to further show her affection for South and commitment to helping those within its community. As her co-workers said, she has given so much of her heart and soul to South.


CLASS GATHERINGS BEING PLANNED FOR THE MAY REUNION WEEKEND

The Ferguson/Timmerman Family

The last family being profiled in this issue did not come to my attention until our anniversary event at Victoria Public School in September. Josephine (Jody) (Ferguson) Timmerman ('76) was one of the alumni in attendance that evening and we got to chatting when she was examining the photos from the 1920's on display. She was delighted to see several photos of her father Robert (Bob) Ferguson ('23) and told me that he had become a doctor like his father and grandfather before him, graduating in Medicine from Western in 1931. Two of her father's siblings had also attended South at the old Victoria School: her aunt Norma, also a 1923 grad, and her uncle John (Jack), a 1925 grad. Bob's youngest sibling, Donald, graduated in 1938.

Jody went on to explain that her father had one child with his first wife, a daughter **Roberta**, born in 1936 and also a South alumna, probably the class of 1954. Several years after his first wife died, he married her mother and had two more children: herself, born when he was 55, and her brother **John Robert**, born two years later, a '78 grad. When Jody told me that her son **Robert Alexander Timmerman** was also a South grad, class of 2011, I knew I had to include her 3-generation story in the newsletter.

AWARD WINNING ACTOR, PLAYWRIGHT, MUSICIAN, MUSIC DIRECTOR & SOUND DESIGNER

- ⇒ **ACTOR:** Beau has performed on theatre stages throughout Canada and been listed among Toronto's top ten theatre actors.
- ⇒ PLAYWRIGHT: He has had his plays commissioned, performed and produced across the country. His award-winning play, *Beneath*Springhill: The Maurice Ruddick Story, (about the Springhill, NS mine disaster) garnered him two Dora Mavor Moore Awards for Best New Play and Best Individual Performance.

- ⇒ MUSICIAN: Born in Detroit, Beau "has music in his roots". He started taking piano lessons at age six. Age 12, he played for his father's church services after the family moved to London. After high school, he pursued music full time, touring in the US, Canada and Europe. He has recorded three solo albums, and recorded and produced numerous albums for professional recording artists. In 2000, Beau started his own recording studio (Sound Kitchen Studio) in Peterborough, ON. Last summer, he was part of Musical Stage Company's celebrated outdoor cabaret series "Porchside Songs", a member of one of the two dynamite musical
- ⇒ MUSIC DIRECTOR: For the past two summers, Beau has been a curator and music director at the Stratford Festival. After the critical success of 2021's Freedom Cabaret: The Spirit and Legacy of Black Music, he returned in 2022 with a second show celebrating the history of Black music (blues, gospel, reggae, soul & jazz), presented by some of Canada's most talented singers and musicians.



⇒ **SOUND DESIGNER:** He was nominated for a Dora Mavor Moore Award for the production of *Rifles* at the Shaw Festival and Praxis Theatre. He also took on the role of music director for Sheridan College and Lakefield College School.

⇒ MISCELLANEOUS:

 In 2010, Beau co-founded Firebrand Theatre (Peterborough), a touring company whose mission is to bring Canadian stories to life for students and educators in elementary, secondary and post-secondary schools throughout Canada.

- In 2011 he was inducted into Peterborough's **Pathway of Fame** honouring contributions to arts & humanities in the area
- ◆ In February, 2020, he was honoured at the proclamation ceremony for Black History Month in Peterborough.

in memoriam

Hugh Seaforth MACKENZIE ('46), Artist, Educator & Friend, died Aug. 1, 2021, age 93. Predeceased by his wife, Dot, and his brother, Michael ('43). He is lovingly remembered by his sister, Landon Pearson ('47), his children, Charles, Mary (Ben) and Patrick (Rowena) and his 4 grandchildren. His formal training began at OCA (1947-50) and continued at Mount Alison University. He began his career as a technical artist, working as a draftsman on the Avro Arrow, and spent much of his professional career as an arts educator at Ontario College of Art from 1968 until 1991. "Hugh was an excellent teacher... He excited the room with his knowledge and enthusiasm." From his first exhibition in 1958 until his last in 2019, Hugh was a widely respected artist.

Dr. Allan Meredith LANSING ('47) passed away July 17, 2022, in Louisville, Kentucky. At the top of his class for all four years of medical school at Western, he earned the Honorable G. Ferguson Trophy for Outstanding Performance in Scholarship, Athletics, and College Life when he graduated. While doing his surgical residency at Western, he earned a PhD in Physiology before going to the USA to train as a cardiovascular surgeon. In 1967, he became chief of cardiovascular surgery at the University of Louisville. His many memorable surgical achievements include assisting with the first kidney transplant in the state of Kentucky in 1964 and performing the first coronary artery bypass in Kentucky. Beyond his medical achievements, Dr. Lansing was honoured for many contributions in other areas of community life.

"He will be remembered for a multitude of personal and academic achievements and for helping improve the lives of countless patients... He lived his life with grace, compassion, selflessness and love." Allan Lansing was predeceased by his wife, Donna, and is survived by his three children, Ann Meredith Lansing, MD, Peter Scott Lansing, MD (Amy), and Michele Lansing Flowers, RN (Kelly), 7 grandchildren & 13 great-grandchildren.

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that **Dr. Frederick Banting**, the Nobel prize winning doctor known the world over for discovering insulin, addressed the staff and students of South Collegiate on October 31st, 1923? South principal T.S.H. ("Tish") Graham had met him in 1910, when they were both Arts undergrads at Victoria College (University of Toronto) and they developed a close friendship. Following Dr. Banting's service during WWI, he came to London where he set up practice at 442 Adelaide St. (now the Banting Museum). Although he only stayed for a year before returning to Toronto so he could access the university laboratories, it was an opportunity for him to reconnect with his friend "Tish". So, when he was asked to come to South in the fall of 1923 to speak to the students, he obliged. Not surprisingly, the students demonstrated their enormous pride and enthusiasm by giving Dr. Banting a huge ovation.
